Equality should mean everyone has access to the same opportunities, and reward merit and effort... not lower standards to ensure equal outcomes.




# INCLUSION: A Culture of Mutual Respect


Inclusion should mean an environment where all are treated with dignity and respect, regardless of their beliefs, backgrounds, or abilities... not silencing differing viewpoints.
